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Remembering the Arden 7

George Peterson cut the ribbon July 12 to officially open the Arden 7 Memorial, a tribute to the seven young men from Arden Avenue, all members of the Winnipeg Grenadiers captured Christmas Day 1941 by the Japanese Imperial Army during the fall of Hong Kong. Peterson, 93, is flanked by Kevin Chief, provincial municipal minister, Mayor Sam Katz and Cllr. Brian Mayes. Peterson is the last survivor of

the Arden 7, all of whom survived the battle. Other members of the Arden 7 were: Fred Abrahams; Bill Lancaster; Morris Peterson; and the Shayler brothers Alfred, Edward and Harry. The memorial, located in Jules Mager Park at the corner of St. Michael and River roads, was the brainchild of Mayes and MLA Chris Melnick (Riel). Taking history to Ag Fair gains rave reviews

The St. Vital Historical Society display at the 105th edition of the St. Vital Agricultural Society annual fair drew rave reviews for the second straight year, thanks to the hard work of Judy and Don Berthman.

The directors spent almost a week sorting through drawers etc. at the museum to put up the four-table display at the fair which ran on Aug. 13-14.

Seventy-five people took the time to sign our guest book.

The Berthmans were aided with the on-site display by Joanne Phillips.

The Berthmans are the tour guides for a Manitoba Music Tour that has attracted almost 100 visitors on four Thursday evenings. On Monday, Aug. 18, they hosted a group

of International music writers who dropped by the museum to check out the Guess Who gold records plus the band's awards and Canadian Music Hall of Fame plaques.

The artifacts were donated by bassist Jim Kale who was raised on Clonard Avenue. The Guess Who were the top-selling band of 1970, even outselling the Beatles and Rolling Stones.

The pianist of the early group, (Al and The Silvertones) which morphed into the Guess Who, was Bob Ashley, who also lived on Clonard. He played on the band's first mega-hit, *Shakin' All Over*.

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
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The St. Vital Historical Society is about to enter a historic time, as the five-month renovation of the 100-year old fire hall is about to begin.

The floor in the three bays, one of which is home to our 1939 Fargo fire truck, is about to be torn up and replaced which should ensure the building will celebrate a bi-centennial in 3014,

but that means we have to move all artifacts from the basement storage rooms, and for that we need your help for the big move which will occur over the week-end of Sept. 13-14.

Archival director Chris Zaste will oversee the packing and move. Many of the items will be able to remain in another area of the basement, but some will have to be placed in a storage area in the back of the fire bay not affected by construction.

Aside from the floor, the renovation will see an upgrade to the heating system and greater control of the steam radiators, some of which currently do not have shut off valves.

The renovation is another highlight for the St. Vital Museum, which has set a record for the number of people taking part in museum activities. At the time

of writing, we've attracted a record 856 people to our activities, so this could be the year that 1,000 visitors sign the guest book.

The wall in the boardroom has been transformed into a display area. White plastic lattice has been strapped to the wall, which allows artifacts, photos etc. to be hung. The wall is home to agricultural photos removed from the fire bay, and posters from the E.J. Casey Shows.

The Winnipeg Police Museum has donated a corner case, which will allow the enlargement of the military display, which will include a piece of shrapnel from Vimy Ridge where Wallie Monroe was twice wounded.

The fire truck will soon be registered and insured, which will allow the 1939 pumper to be driven to various shows and festivals. A 1970 bureaucratic snafu saw the truck registered as a 1946 instead of a 1939 so we had to prove the proper vintage. Thanks to Jack Mavins, of the Manitoba Classic and Antique Auto Club, we have the necessary proof — our truck is one of 487 two-ton Fargos made in 1939.

At the August board of directors meeting, Chris Zaste was appointed as the first Director of Archives. Chris is a former summer student and a graduate of archival studies at the the University of Manitoba.

Details on our 2014-15 Budget

When we began working on the 2014-2015 budget in November 2013, we wanted to ensure ratepayers were involved in the budget development. We sought input through a public form and conducted an online survey - one we will promote more widely and make available earlier in future years. We want to hear from as many in the community as possible!

In feedback, we heard clearly that you want an education system that goes beyond the 3 R's; valuing the Arts, French Immersion, physical activity and inclusion.

At its most basic, the budget funds the operations of our division. It's in the allocation details of the budget where the School Board Members and the administration work to ensure we can meet our priorities – literacy and numeracy; engagement in learning; and active citizenship – that underpin our daily activities and allows us to go beyond the 3 R's.

Here are some facts on a budget that will provide the resources to make improvements in all three priorities:

School Division Budgeting Facts:

- The province provides 51.1% of the funds LRSD requires; we need to raise most of the balance through local taxation.
- 83.7% of our budget covers salaries and benefits for LRSD employees.
- A provincial increase of 2% was not provided to LRSD; we were one of 18 school divisions that received 0% increase.

Our Budget for 2014-2015:

- The percentage increase from last year is 2.99% (from \$156,533,605 to \$161,212,533).
- The percentage increase on taxes paid by residents is 3.25%.
 - Residents have had a 0% increase for two years in a row while the province has been in tight fiscal times.

Factors Affecting our Budget:

- The requirement for smaller class sizes in grades Kindergarten to grade three (20 students or fewer) by 2017 creates a need for more classrooms and more teachers, both of which directly affect our budget needs. In the last two years, we have moved from 31% of those classes having 20 students or less to 84%.
- We are committed to trying to reduce the class sizes in grades four through eight classes, ideally achieving class sizes of 25 to 26 students. This also will affect our budget as we work towards this goal. In the last two years, we have moved from 84% of those classes having 27 students or less to 90.6%.
- We have infrastructure improvements needed at many schools.
- We require extra bussing due to school changes in South St. Vital.
- We want to continue to provide opportunities for excellent professional development / professional learning for all staff.

Goals for our 2014 - 2015 Budget:

By the end of the 2015 school year, we expect our budget will have helped result in:

- Continued decrease in K-8 class sizes;
- No cuts to student programs;
- Shifting of resources to meet evolving school needs;
- Maintaining a reserve fund of 3.1% (Auditor General recommends 3-5%).

Sage Creek School Development
